



Self-Service Technology

intro.

Technology in the service industry, and technologies integration into our society is an important topic,, and one largely taken for granted. With the introduction of yet another major self-service technology the "self-checkout" for retail and grocery stores, we are forced to think of the implications self service technologies entail. What is self-check out? What does it mean to us? Who should decide if this new technology should be implemented? And how does this effect our communication?

What is self checkout?

The self-checkout system is an automated retail checkout lane which is operated by the customer and not by the employee. The self checkout lane is being substituted for the express lane at over 1000 retail

stores nation wide. As you walk through you scan your items over the barcode reader and insert your money into the machine. Your change comes out and you bag your items and leave without saving a word to anyone. All this while the self-checkout security system runs vigilantly. A security camera is in place and records every movel you make to ensure your "customer integrity", while weight sensors on the table next to the scanner ensure that all items have been scanned and not just "passed over" the scanning box. In essence the "self-checkout system" is in place to make shopping allegedly faster, easier, and to improve customer These self-checkout service. machines are placed at over 1000 locations nation wide. The self-checkout system was released in 1997 to a



few select retail grocery stores who would "give it a chance" and see how the customers react to it. Since that time many other grocery stores and a few retail department stores have integrated the self-checkout into their stores. Some of the stores carrying the new self-checkout system are: by Fred Woodworth. Jen Angel and Theo Witsell come together to produce what is in my opinion one of the best zines Ive read in awhile. Andy from Submission hold, writes this personal zine, not too far from the likes of the classic comet bus. There are some seriously funny/ironic stories in here worth the read. This is a distant period in Andy's life that he recalls with fairly good accuracy. Almost every story he some how ends up "hammered" and waking up somewhere strange. To quote the intro to his December entry "Booze makes some people do very stupid things. I am one of those people!" One of his friends gets beat up by this gang called the "Dirt devils" and so (totally drunk) Andy decides he will single handedly kick all their asses and goes to fight, but when he is totally beaten senseless, he wakes up with no wallet, and no memory of what had happened to him. You can only laugh at that kind of stuff. With a title like "I'm Johnny and I don't give a fuck" you have to go with your instincts. Avow #8 "We must get down to the heart of the matter" / 8.5x5.5 / 40 something pages. Very interesting. A mix of Art/Poetry/Punk Rock/Political/Personal type material. This zine is very well rounded in subject matter, and Keith Certainly is not afraid to discuss his personal feelings, or even his own failure with the reader, that's nice to see. Looking back possibly the most memorable article is a letter from his friend Alex who writes 4 pages of personal thoughts on what success is. Is success having a well paying job? Or going to college? Or having a nice car? very thought provocing. But one of his more obvious and powerful topics is that of advertising and consumer culture. Basically, advertising is here to sell us things, obviously things we don't need, because if we needed them, we wouldn't need to be told to buy them. So there is this notion of wanting you to be unhappy to be able to sell you things to "fill your void" and "make you happy". The essence of this argument is that capitalism and marketing feed on insecurity and sadness, they make money off of our unhappiness and lack of personal fulfillment. First of all its cool because even though it's a split issue there is an overall theme to it (technology) and both authors (Jen, and Theo) contribute along with other columnists to the discussion of who regulates technology? Should all technology be implemented? What are the effects of certain technologies? Very in-depth (as much as can be said with only 100 pages on the subject) on questions technology raises. Interview with Tony Wong discussing civil disobedience, and animal rights. An interesting although not thoroughly convincing article on computers

Kroger, Brookshires, King Soopers, Winn Dixie, Super One, and many others. The main companies involved in production and distribution of the system are NCR, Symbol, PSC, Production Solutions, and SASI (Stores Automated Systems inc.) As far as future implementations of the self-

checkout system goes, the

Kroger company has already made arrangements to install 12 new systems in the next 6 months, and more companies are starting to invest in the idea. Vice President of Worldwide Marketing, at PSC inc. Stuart M. Itkin commented, "Shoppers at stores that have the U-scan (self-checkout) have quickly embraced the system b/c it enables them to get in and out of the store faster. U-scan express which brings that same connivance of self-service to the supermarket is HOW WE'LL ALL CHECKOUT OUR GROCERIES IN THE FUTURE."

What does this mean to us?

All this "wonderful" new technology is coming in so quickly who has time to ask why? Or do we even need this? Would resources be better spent somewhere else? The question is what does self-checkout and all these new service based technologies such as "pay at the pump", automated service, automated teller machines (ATM's) Drive through banking, vending machines every block, drive through fast food technologies, and the myriad ocean of other little gadgets that have replaced human services in the past 50 years mean to us? What this means is that our labor market is turning more service based, the only jobs left will be for workers to stand and communicate with customers and maintain the technologies that will soon take their place in 5 years. These new technologies also indicate a steep turn toward a more unskilled labor market, which is exactly what they want. We need only know how to run and operate the technologies that service the customer. It takes little or no skill to push buttons all day and work the machines that take your place. Forget direct service, we now have "more efficient" indirect ways. What all this means is that there will be less and less jobs open for skilled workers and many more open for the unskilled worker to simply learn his/her skill in a day or two of training, and receive the lowest wage. What this does is supply the capitalist "free market" with a flood of unskilled workers to be used at their expense and exploited by the system and discarded when yet another new "wonderful" service technology comes out. For example over 200 years ago right before the start of the industrial revolution, England had a primarily textile based economy. In the area of Nottinghamshire majority of the population worked in the textile factories as skilled weavers. A small town where everyone knows everyone, now entered large frames and steam engines that could produce a better quality product at a faster rate. This meant the value of skilled labor had dropped significantly, and now skilled weavers who received a high wage for their skill and experience were to only operate the machinery and be paid as unskilled button pushing slaves. And what a surprise their positions were instantly filled with women and children to work for half the

price and double the hours! This is the same age old story of the implementation of technology and increase in human suffering, and movement to an incredibly unskilled labor market. "The question", should we implement this new technology? Is not asked enough, more often it is only the question of "how" we should implement a new technology. But what does this mean to our

privacy? The self-checkout along with the automated banking machines and even pay at the pump services are equipped with the ever watching eyes of the video recorder. Everywhere we turn it seems we are being watched by one corporation or another. At your favorite fast food restaurant, at the bank, at the movie rental store, and pretty much any corporate retail store. You are watched at work, and even in the bathrooms. Your every mundane movement tape recorded for posterity/security (mockery?). Are all those cameras and "security" measures meant to make us feel "safe"? Do you feel safe?

Who decides if technology should be implemented?

It seems an important question to ask "who is deciding what new technologies are used and which ones aren"t, and for what reason"!? The people who decide what technology is implemented and what it is used for are the same people who paid to have the technology built and who paid to advertise it and create its needThe corporate elite. Who else?! It is not the inventor who decides that his invention should be used and is ethical and ready for distribution. It is the corporations that pay his/her salary and will give him/her grants in which to bring the creation to life.


So who should be deciding the integration of new technologies? It makes sense that the people who will be buying and who will be using the technology should be the ones who decide "if" it should be integrat-

It all made me think about who I was, where I was going, and why I am pursing education through both school and independent means. To be knowledgeable is to know the world and its workings. It seems too often you see people living off welfare struggling with a hungry family, but their techno gadgets come first, TV, VCRs, a nice car, cable TV, "without cable what would we do"?? eat maybe? The corporations are the ones running the show, there is one thing all their decisions will be based on when integrating new technologies, could it be, morality?, real need, betterment of humanity, aid to the impoverished,? Try none of the above. One thing is all they care about and is the basis for every decision they will ever make, PROFIT! We can NOT trust them to make these decisions for us. These corporations are only using the self-checkout system to cut labor costs! With the new express lanes that don't need an employee to work them, that employee can hit the streets, and if they don't like it or anyone there has a problem with it, there a hundred other unskilled workers waiting to take their place. These companies are using machines to cut labor costs so they don't have to pay anyone to work checkout machines. I'm sure the president would be quite happy if "its

Hell!! No more labor costs, only security cameras to bust some poor guy trying to steal a bottle of aspirin for his sick wife that cant find work because every store in the nation now runs on "self-checkout" and her job stolen by the same machine that will now arrest her husband for stealing her medicine.

Communication.

But along this technological journey to our own doom where has communication gone in the service industry as a result of the new techno gadgets in every retail store? Consultant Jerry Morton for NCR says "The self-checkout concept will win more acceptance, he believes when retailers begin looking at it as a <u>customer service</u> toll rather than as a way to <u>cut labor costs</u>". First of all the corporations will NOT stop looking at the self-checkout as a way to cut labor costs because that would not be in their interests nor would it be profitable to ignore such profit potential. Second, how is the self-checkout system to be used and looked at as a "customer service" tool when in fact it is not. NCR is only trying to once

The CNT believed that when the workers took over the means of production and distribution this would lead to "the liquidation of the bourgeois state which would die of asphyxiation." History teaches us a different lesson. In a situation of dual power it is very necessary to smash the state. No ruling class ever leaves the stage of history voluntarily.

In contrast to this the Friends of Durruti were clear that, and this is a quote from their programme 'Towards a Fresh Revolution', "to beat Franco we need to crush the bourgeoisie and its Stalinist and Socialist allies. The capitalist state must be destroyed totally and there must be installed workers' power depending on rank & file committees. Apolitical anarchism has failed." The political confusion of the CNT leadership was such that they attacked the idea of the workers siezing power as "evil" and leading to an "anarchist dictatorship."

The syndicalist movement, organised in the International Workers Association and outside it, still refuses to admit the CNT was wrong to postpone the revolution and enter the government. They attempt to explain away this whole episode as being due to "exceptional circumstances" that "will not occur again.". Because they refuse to admit that a mistake of historic proportions was made, there is no reason to suppose that they would not repeat it (should they get a chance).

Despite our criticisms we should recognise that the syndicalist unions, where they still exist, are far more progressive than any other union. Not only do they create democratic unions and create an atmosphere where anarchist ideas are listened to with respect but they also organise and fight in a way that breaks down the divisions into leaders and led, doers and watchers. On its own this is very good but not good enough. The missing element is an organisation winning support for anarchist ideas and anarchist methods both within revolutionary unions and everywhere else workers are brought together. That is the task of the anarchist-communists.

Because the syndicalist organisation is the union, it organises all workers regardless of their politics. Historically many workers have joined, not because they were anarchists, but because the syndicalist union was the most militant and got the best results. Because of this tendencies always appeared that were reformist. This raises the question of the conflict between being a trade union or a revolutionary anarchist organisation.

Syndicalists are quite correct to emphasise the centrality of organising workers in the workplace. Critics who reject syndicalism on the grounds that it cannot organise those outside the workplace are wrong. Taking the example of anarcho-syndicalism in Spain it is clear that they could and did organise throughout the entire working class as was evidenced by the Iberian Federation of Libertarian Youth, the 'Mujeras Libres' (Free Women), and the neighbourhood organisations.



SPAIN

The weakness of syndicalism is rooted in its view of why workers are tied to capitalism, and its view of what is necessary to make the revolution. Spain in 1936/7 represented the highest point in anarcho-syndicalist organisation and achievement. Because of their a-politicism they were unable to develop a programme for workers' power, to wage a political battle against other currents in the workers' movement (such as reformism and Stalinism). Indeed syndicalists seem to ignore other ideas more often than combating them. In Spain they were unable to give a lead to the entire class by fighting for complete workers' power.

Instead they got sucked into support for the Popular Front government, which in turn led to their silence and complicity when the Republican state moved against the collectives and militias. The minority in the CNT, organised around the Friends of Durruti, was expelled when they issued a proclamation calling for the workers to take absolute power (ie that they should refuse to share power with the bosses or the authoritarian parties).

again make you think (and in the process make themselves believe) that this new technology is for the aid of the consumer, when it is not. How will this effect communication and customer service in the stores? The people will come in speak to no one, get their food, scan it, talk to no one, pay and then leave, like a ghost town as the overseer sits in a box and monitors the cameras leeringly making sure no one is stealing, as he himself is recorded. This is neither communication or customer service, who are they trying to fool? Once again technology builds an impenetrable wall in which communication is crushed. Television, video games, and even cell phones annihilate real communication between people. They serve to separate neighbors and alienate families. I am not saying they do not have their good points of communication, but the kind of communication they are promoting is that of impersonal, alienated, babble. For example: Cell phones may keep people in touch in situations such as while driving, or at the store, or in the movies, but what happens to the people they are with? Real communication to the person next to you is substituted for artificial impersonal communication to someone somewhere else who is also ignoring someone at the same time. Communication is important to us as people and we must recognize when it is being taken away from us.

Outro.

There are very important points on technology, its use in the service industry, and its effect on labor. When new technologies come out we need to ask ourselves these kind of questions, because if we don't we will certainly, blindly, obediently, obliterate our own lives. I don't have an answer to the "machine question" and I'm not sure how much good any sort of boycott would do. Its extremely important we think about these things as they apply to us and the world around us. No one will stand up for us, we have to take that initiative ourselves.

Norway, Britain, Bulgaria and Portugal. A message of support was received from Uruguay.

Things were not looking good for the re-emergence of anarcho-syndicalism. In Eastern Europe the Stalinists allowed no free discussion, strikes or free trade unions. Certainly not anarchist ones! In the West massive subsidies from the US and the Catholic church went to tame unions controlled by Christian Democrats and Social Democrats. Meanwhile Russia did the same for their allies who controlled the French CGT, the Italian CGIL and others. The IWA, in its weakened state couldn't compete for influence. In the late 1950s the Swedish SAC withdrew from the IWA. There was now not a single functioning union in its ranks.

It staggered on as a collection of small propaganda groups and exile organisations like the Spanish and Bulgarian CNTs. Some wondered would it live much longer. But suddenly in 1977 Franco died and his regime fell. The CNT blossomed. Within a matter of months its membership leaped from a few hundred activists to 150,000. [Problems later developed within the CNT and a split occurred which left us with two unions whose combined membership today probably does not reach 30,000, though this is still a significant number.] The growth of the CNT put syndicalism back on the anarchist agenda. The IWA now claims organisations which function at least partly as unions (in Italy, France and Spain) and propaganda groups in about another dozen countries.

Outside the IWA are syndicalist unions and organisations like the 16,000 strong SAC in Sweden, the OVB in the Netherlands, the Spanish CGT, the Solidarity-Unity-Democracy(4) union in the French post office, the CRT in Switzerland, and others. Some are less anarchist and more reformist than others. Say what we will about them we must recognise that syndicalism is today the largest organised current in the international anarchist movement. This means it is especially important to understand them.

SOME PROBLEMS

Anarchist-Communists do have criticisms of their politics, or more accurately lack of politics. Judging from their own statements, methods and propaganda the syndicalists see the biggest problem in the structure of the existing unions rather than in the ideas that tie workers to authoritarian, capitalist views of the world.

Syndicalists do not create revolutionary political organisations. They want to create industrial unions. Their strategy is apolitical, in the sense that they argue that all that's essential to make the revolution is for workers to seize the factories



not forget that both Connolly and Larkin were influenced by the IWW. Connolly was an organiser for their building workers union in New York state and Larkin delivered the oration at Joe Hill's funeral.

DECLINE

The success of the Bolsheviks did great harm to the workers movement outside Russia. Many were impressed by what was happening in Russia, Communist Parties sprang up almost everywhere. The Bolshevik model appeared successful. Many sought to copy it. This was before the reality of the Soviet dictatorship became widely known.

Nevertheless the syndicalist movement still held on to most of its support. The real danger was the rise of fascism. With the rule of Mussolini, the Italian USI. the largest syndicalist union in the world, was driven underground and then out of existence. The German FAUD, Portuguese CGT, Dutch NSV, French CDSR and many more in Eastern Europe and Latin America were not able to survive the fascism and military dictatorships of the 1930s and 40s.(2)

It was at the same time that the Spanish revolution unfolded, which was to represent both the highest and lowest points of syndicalism(3). More about this below.

The Polish syndicalist union with 130,000 workers, the ZZZ, was on the verge of applying for membership of the IWA when it was crushed by the Nazi invasion. But, as with syndicalists elsewhere, they did not go down without a fight. The Polish ZZZ along with the Polish Syndicalist Association took up arms against the nazis and in 1944 even managed to publish a paper called Syndicalista. In 1938, despite their country being under the Salazar dictatorship since the 1920s, the Portuguese CGT could still claim 50,000 members in their now completely illegal and underground union. In Germany, trials for high treason were carried out against militants of the FAUD. There were mass trials of members. many of whom didn't survive the concentration camps.

One point worthy of mention about the Spanish CNT shows the hypocrisy of the British government which called itself anti-fascist. Not only were Italian anti-fascist exiles interned on the Isle of Man but CNT members whose underground movement assisted British airmen, Jews and anti-fascists to escape through Spain to Britain were repaid at the end of the war when their names were handed over to Franco's secret police.

THE RUMP

By the end of WWII, the European syndicalist movement and the IWA was almost destroyed. The CNT was now an exile organisation, in 1951 the IWA held their first post-war congress in Toulouse. This time they were a much smaller organisation than the great movement which existed at their first congress. Nevertheless they still represented something. There is something that people have to do everyday of their lives. Its, a necessity, a basis, a foundation for life as we know it. THE BASIC IDEA

Its basic ideas revolve around organising all workers into the one big union, keeping control in the hands of the rank & file, and opposing all attempts to create a bureaucracy of unaccountable full-time officials. Unlike other unions their belief is that the union can be used not only to win reforms from the bosses but also to overthrow the capitalist system. They hold that most workers are not revolutionaries because the structure of their unions is such that it takes the initiative away from the rank & file. Their alternative is to organise all workers into the one big union in preparation for a revolutionary general strike.

They established their own international organisation with the founding of the International Workers Association in Berlin in 1922. Present at that conference were the Argentine Workers Regional Organisation FORA representing 200,000 members, the Industrial Workers of the World in Chile representing 20,000, the Union for Syndicalist Propaganda in Denmark with 600, the Free Workers Union of Germany FAUD with 120,000, National Workers Secretariat of the Netherlands representing 22,500, the Italian Syndicalist Union with 500,000, the General Confederation of Workers in Portugal with 150,000, the Swedish Workers Central Organisation SAC with 32,000, the Committee for the Defence of Revolutionary Syndicalism in France [a breakaway from the CGT] with 100,000, the Federation du Battiment from Paris representing 32,000. The Spanish CNT was unable to send delegates due to the fierce class struggle being waged in their country under the dictatorship of Primo de Rivera. They did, however, join the following year.

During the 1920s the IWA expanded. More unions and propaganda groups entered into dialogue with the IWA secretariat. They were from Mexico, Uruguay, Bulgaria, Poland, Japan, Australia, SouthAfrica, Paraguay and North Africa.

Syndicalist unions outside the IWA also existed in many countries such as the Brazilian Workers Regional Organisation and the Industrial Workers of the World in the USA (which soon spread to Canada, Sweden, Australia, South Africa, and Britain(1)). The influence of its methods, if not necessarily of its anarchist origins, was even seen in Ireland where the ITGWU throughout its existence, until it merged into SIPTU a few years ago, carried the letters OBU on its badge. This OBU refers to the IWW slogan of One Big Union. And let us



its strengths & weaknesses

SYNDICALISM is the largest organised tendency in the libertarian movement today. It has built large workers' unions, led major struggles, been the popular expression of anarchism in many countries. To understand the anarchist-communist view of syndicalism we have to look at its roots, its core beliefs and its record.

In the 1860s the modern socialist movement was beginning to take shape. The International Working Mens' Association, better known as the First International, was becoming a pole of attraction for militant workers. As the movement grew. points of agreement and of disagreement between the Marxists and the Anarchists about what socialism meant and how to achieve it were becoming clear. This led to the Marxists using less than democratic means to expel the anarchists

In 1871 the Paris Commune came into being when the workers of Paris seized their city. When they were finally defeated seven thousand Communards were dead or about to be executed. A reign of terror against the Left swept Europe. The anarchists were driven underground in country after country. This did not auger well for a rapid growth of the movement. In response to the terror of the bosses, their shooting down of strikers and protesting peasants and their suppression of the anarchist movement a minority launched an armed campaign, known as propaganda by deed, and killed several kings, queens, aristocrats and senior politicians.

Though very understandable, this drove a further wedge between the bulk of the working class and the movement. Clandestine work became the norm in many countries. Mass work became increasingly difficult. The image of the madman with a bomb under his arm was born. The movement was making no significant gains.

By the turn of the century many anarchists were convinced that a new approach was needed. They called for a return to open and public militant activity among workers. The strategy they developed was syndicalism.



conservation should follow the example of the Worldlife Center in London. The Center plans to create a high-tech zoo with no animals. Visitors would observe animals in the wild via live satellite links with far off places like the Amazon rain forest, the Great Barrier reef, and Africa.(9)

What You Can Do

&Zoos are covered under the federal Animal Welfare Act (AWA), which sets minimal housing and maintenance standards for captive animals. The AWA requires that all animal displays be licensed with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which must inspect zoos once a year. However, some zoos that have passed USDA inspections with flying colors have later been found by humane groups to have numerous violations. Educate yourself. Read Beyond the Bars, edited by Virginia McKenna, Will Travers, and Jonathan Wray. It is available from Thorson's Publishing Group in Rochester, Vt.

It is best not to patronize a zoo unless you are actively working to change its conditions. Avoid smaller, roadside zoos at all costs. If no one visits these substandard operations, they will be forced to close down.

Start a "Zoocheck" program to build a strong case for implementing changes: Contact PETA for Zoocheck program materials and information on how to get started with your local zoo.

heart disease (2). This is a clear indication and warning to our eating behaviors! We can see the warnings. In fact people we love have died from them, but still do we listen to their foreboding death sentence? No! Does it feel like these mega corporations are putting us on death row?

Fast food makes it easy and greasy to receive instant fulfillment and effortless purchase of something you didn't make yourself and an object only for your quick consumption. When we do this we become alienated from our consumption and have no realization of what we are eating and why we are eating it (besides the fact that we are hungry).

Zoos:

Pitiful Prisons

Despite their professed concern for animals, zoos remain more "collections" of interesting "items" than actual havens or simulated habitats. Zoos teach people that it is acceptable to keep animals in captivity, bored, cramped, lonely, and far from their natural homes.

Says Virginia McKenna, star of the classic movie Born Free and now an active campaigner in behalf of captive animals: "It is the sadness of zoos which haunts me. The purposeless existence of the animals. For the four hours we spend in a zoo, the animals spend four years, or fourteen, perhaps even longer -- if not in the same zoo then in others -- day and night; summer and winter. . . . This is not conservation and surely it is not education. No, it is 'entertainment.' Not comedy, however, but tragedy."(1)

Zoos range in size and quality from cageless parks to small roadside

menageries with concrete slabs and iron bars. The larger the zoo and the greater the number and variety of the animals it contains, the more it costs to provide quality care for the animals. Although more than 112 million people visit zoos in the United States and Canada every year, most zoos operate at a loss and must find ways to cut costs (which sometimes means selling animals) or add gimmicks that will attract visitors. Zoo officials often consider profits ahead of the animals' wellbeing. A former director of the Atlanta Zoo once remarked that he was "too far removed from the animals: they're the last thing I worry about with all the other problems," (2)

Animals suffer from more than neglect in some zoos. When Dunda, an African elephant, was transferred from the San Diego Zoo to the San Diego Wild Animal Park, she was chained, pulled to the ground, and beaten with ax handles for two days. One witness described the blows as "home run swings." Such abuse may be the norm. "You have to motivate them," says San Francisco zookeeper Paul Hunter of

elephants, "and the way you do that is by beating the hell out of them."(3)

Propagation, Not Education

Zoos claim to educate people and preserve species, but they frequently fall short on both counts. Most zoo enclosures are quite small, and labels provide little more information than the species' name, diet, and natu-

ral range. The animals' normal behavior is seldom discussed, much s s observed because their natural needs are seldom met. Birds' wings may be clipped SO they cannot aquatic animals often little have water, and the many animals who naturally live in large herds or family groups are often kept alone or, at most, in pairs. Natural hunt-

ing and mating behaviors are virtually eliminated by regulated feeding and breeding regimens. The animals are closely confined, lack privacy, and have little opportunity for mental stimulation or physical exercise, resulting in abnormal and self-destructive behavior, called zoochosis.

A worldwide study of zoos conducted by the Born Free

Foundation revealed that zoochosis is rampant in confined animals around the globe.(4) Another study found that elephants spend 22 percent of their time engaging in abnormal behaviors, such as repeated head bobbing or biting cage bars, and bears spend about 30 percent of their time pacing, a sign of distress.(5)

One sanctuary that is home to

More than half the world's zoos "are still in bad conditions" and treating chimpanzees poorly, according to renowned chimpanzee expert Jane Goodall.(6)

As for education, zoo visitors usually spend only a few minutes at each display, seeking entertainment rather than enlightenment. A study of the zoo in Buffalo, N.Y., found that most people passed cages quickly, and
