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# **Preface**

TASCALC is supplied either on tape or disc.

The tape version runs on **both** the 128K Spectrum+ and on the Spectrum +2. The tape version may be transferred to microdrive.

The disc version runs on the ZX Spectrum +3.

This manual describes both versions. In the few instances where there are differences in operation the tape/microdrive version is referred to as the +2 (meaning +2 and 128K Spectrum+) and the disc version is referred to as the +3.

#### 1. Getting Started with TASCALC

#### Learning to use TASCALC

We supposed that you learn to use TASCALC by the following stens:

(1) read section 2 on 'How TASCALC works':

(2) load TASCALC following the procedure described in section 3:

(3) try the simple exercises outlined below which explain how to enter data and calculate formulae:

(4) try creating your own simple spreadsheet. As you enter data so you will discover which of the TASCALC commands are most useful to you. The various commands available are outlined on the bein page and described in detail in section 7.

#### Exercise 1 Entering numerical data

Formulae give a spreadsheet its real power by allowing you to evaluate information contained in one part and to display the result elsewhere. TASCALC allows formulae to be entered in one of two ways. This exercise deals with entering formulae for immediate calculation.


We might, for example, wish to find the sum of the numbers in cells C005, C006 and C007 and return the answer to cell C009. With the cursor in cell C009 type:

$$10+20+30$$

As soon as you type the first character the prompt 'Type number:' appears at the bottom of the screen. Although the program is prompting you to enter a number, TASCALC also allows you to enter a formula in the same manner as you enter a number. Entering a formula in such a manner results in the formula being calculated immediately and the result returned to the current cell. Finish typing the formula and press **ENTER**. The result of the calculation is then entered into the current cell.

# Exercise 2 Entering text Editing text Entering stored formulae Calculating formulae using the XECUTE command

Enter the numbers shown so that the spreadsheet appears as follows. If you make a mistake and type the wrong number into a cell use the **DELETE** key to erase the contents of that cell and then retype the number.



The negative values are entered by simply typing a minus sign (SYMBOL SHIFT and **J**) before the number.

So far we have only dealt with entering numerical data into a cell. However, a cell may contain one of three types of data:

Numbers Text Formulae

### **ENTERING TEXT**


Once you have entered the numerical data displayed above, move the grid cursor to cell E002. To enter text into a cell you must press the "key (quote) on the bottom row of the keyboard. Try entering the text TOTALS into cell E002. Pressing the "key displays the prompt 'Enter text:' at the bottom of the screen. Type the text TOTALS and press **ENTER**.

If you want to edit any text after it has been entered into a cell you may do so by moving the grid cursor to the relevant cell and pressing the **EDIT** key. Try using the **EDIT** key on cell E002. The text TOTALS appears at the bottom of the screen with a line shaped cursor. The arrow keys can be used to move the line cursor so you may correct the text. Press **ENTER** to put the text shown at the bottom of the screen back into the current cell.

Try entering the following text into the cells listed below:

D008 = SUB TOTAL D010 = ADD VAT D012 = TOTAL

The spreadsheet should now appear as follows.



### ENTERING FORMULAE

The first exercise demonstrated how you may type a formula into a cell for immediate execution. However, you may also store a formula in a cell which is only executed upon using one of the TASCALC commands.

To instruct TASCALC to enter a formula into a cell you must press the ENTER key.

# 2. How TASCALC Works

# Introduction

TASCALC is a spreadsheet which can be used for planning, budgeting, tabulating or simply presenting information in a clear, easy to read manner.

Text and numbers entered with TASCALC are presented in a worksheet format. On-screen prompts assist you in setting up the worksheet by a series of keypresses. Various commands allow the user to manipulate the contents of the worksheet. In addition parts of the worksheet may be connected together so that information changed in one part can be evaluated and represented in another form elsewhere. There are thus two phases in the use of the spreadsheet: entry of the data followed by the calculation of formulae.

Once produced, the worksheet can be stored on disc, microdrive cartridge or cassette tape to access, edit and print at a later date.

# The Spreadsheet

TASCALC organises the worksheet, or spreadsheet, as a grid of 157 rows by 52 columns. Each column is identified by a letter (A, B to Z, AA to AZ). The spreadsheet rows are identified by a number (1 to 157).

# Cells

The coordinates of the rows and columns — for example A100 — identify specific locations within the spreadsheet called 'cells'. The top left cell of the spreadsheet grid is A1 and the bottom right cell is AZ157.

You enter data into the cells. Only one cell is 'active' at any one time. This cell is called the 'current' cell. When you enter data it is entered into the current cell. The current cell is identified on the screen by the grid cursor. The grid cursor can be moved from cell to cell using the arrow keys on the keyboard.

# **Cell Contents**

A cell may contain one of three types of data — numbers, text and formulae. Text, such as 'Sales', 'Costs' or 'January' are useful for descriptions or headings. Formulae allow calculations to be made based on the value stored in another cell or in a group of cells. It is these formulae that give TASCALC its real power — whole areas of the grid may be linked together, their contents evaluated and the result produced elsewhere.

# The Window

The spreadsheet grid is too large to be displayed on screen all at once. The screen thus acts as a 'window', moving over the grid to keep the current cell in view. Movement of the window is called 'scrolling'.

# **Entering Information**

The bottom two lines of the display are used for entering information. On loading TASCALC displays some status information on the last but one line showing the current cell, its contents and the width of the current column.

When you select one of the commands you are prompted to enter a command. The 'prompt box' occupying the top section of the screen changes to display the relevant prompt. The bottom line is the entry line where you instruct TASCALC to perform some operation by typing commands or data. To minimise the number of keypresses required you need only type the first character of a command in response to a prompt. For example, to copy one part of the spreadsheet to another you simply enter Command Mode and type **C** to select the COPY command.

# The Command and Control Keys

Various commands and control keys allow you to manipulate the grid or its contents. All of these commands are described in detail in the section dealing with Command Mode. If you are unsure of a command just press the H key to view the TASCALC help page. The help page summarises the various commands available.

# **Cell References**

Many TASCALC operations require you to identify a cell or a group of cells. Identifying a cell you wish some operation to affect is called a 'cell reference'. Cells can be referenced by two different methods.

- A DIRECT reference identifies a cell by its column and row co-ordinates. For example, A001 indicates the cell located in row 001 of column A. AB100 refers to the cell in row 100 of column AB. The column is always specified first in a cell reference.
- 2. Reference by LABELS identifies a single cell by a text label, e.g. 'Sales' or 'Costs'.

You can also reference a cell by a text label intersection, for example 'Sales.Costs', using a dot to separate the two labels. When searching for a label intersection, TASCALC finds the cell where the row from the second label (Costs) intersects the column of the first label (Sales). Thus if the text label 'Sales' is located in cell C001 and the text label 'Costs' is located in cell A010, then the intersection 'Sales.Costs' identifies the cell at C010.

# **Cell Ranges**

Many commands require you to identify a group or 'range' of cells. A range of cells should be represented in the form CELL1:CELL2. CELL1 is the top left cell of the group, CELL2 is the bottom right cell of the range and the two references are separated by a colon.

Cell ranges can be specified by both direct reference and by labels.

A direct range reference, such as A001:B157, identifies the range of cells from A001 to B157.

Alabel rance reference identifies a range using text label intersections for example

Single label references (e.g. SALES.COSTS) are nor allowed. The above example indicates the block of cells from the intersection of the SALES COSTS labels to the Intersection of the COSTS SALES labels

You can specify a range by a single label (e.g. SALES). If you specify a range in such a manner than a search is made through the grid for that label. Once the label is found a search is made for the pearest number along the row and down the column from the tabel. If numbers are found only in the row then the range is taken to be the row from the label to the lar right of the grid. If numbers are found only in the column then the range is taken to be that from the label to the bottom of the column if numbers are closest to the label.

You cannot mix numeric characters with non-numeric characters. According to the numerical value entered, TASCALC may automatically round up a figure or display the value in standard form (e.g. 1E+4 instead of E000). A number may be entered in full or in standard form (e.g. 100000 or 1E+5). Should it not be possible to display a number TASCALC will insert [n] into the cell indicating that the cell is not empty but that the number cannot be displayed.

Negative values are entered by typing a minus sign in front of the required value, e.g. -100.

To erase a number from a cell use the DELETE key (section 6) or the RUBOUT

By default TASCALC aligns all numbers by decimal point. Numbers are automatically displayed to 2 decimal places and then justified against the right side of the cell. As all numbers are displaced to the same number of decimal places then all numerical values are aligned by decimal point. To after the justification of numbers refer to the Nov move also enter a formula in response to the promot for a number. A formula entered in such a manner is evaluated immediately and the result entered into the current cell. For example, you might enter IS/300+300 to find ISN: of 300. #### **Entering Formulae**

formulae are used for performing calculations. There are two ways of entering formulae. A formula may be entered as a number in which case the formula is calculated immediately, the result returned to the current cell and the original formula then discarded (see exercise 2, section 1) Alternatively, a formula may be stored in a cell

To identify that you wish to store a formula into the current cell press the ENTER key.

Note that you may also use a direct/label cell reference with any function where you would expect to find a numerical value, e.g. (A001/100) \* 15 which divides the contents of cell A001 by 100 and multiples the result by 15.

Errors made whilst typing a formula can be corrected using the DELETE key. To amend a formula after it has been entered into a cell use the EDIT key (section 6).

Formula calculations use the numeric value of a cell. The numeric value of a cell containing a number is the number contained within that cell.

# **Relative and Absolute Formulae**

A formula may make reference to a cell. For example the formula A1+B1 means add the numerical value in cell A1 to the numerical value in cell B1. Where a formula makes reference to a cell then that formula may be relative or absolute.

Relative: some commands cause a formula to be copied or moved to new locations. It is usually desirable to have formulae automatically adjusted for their new locations. For example, cell C1 might contain the formula A1+B1. If columns A, B and C were subsequently moved right by one column (as would occur if a blank column was inserted at column A) then the formula in cell C1 is relatively adjusted to fit with its new position. The formula, now located in cell D1, would be relatively adjusted to B1+C1.

> A relative formula thus refers to the contents of another cell as measured from the cell in which that formula is stored.

Absolute: an absolute formula refers to the contents of the specified target cell, irrespective of later changes in the grid. For example, cell C1 might contain the formula A1+B1. If columns A, B and C were subsequently moved right by one column, then the formula in cell C1 (if absolute) would not be adjusted to fit in with its new location. The formula would still read A1 + B1.

> To specify that a formula is absolute you must prefix the cell reference with a \$ character. Thus to specify that the formula A1+B1 is an absolute formula you would enter \$A1+\$B1.

Remember that you may also enter a formula in response to the prompt to enter a number. A formula entered in such a manner is evaluated immediately and the result entered into the current cell.

# 6. Control Keys

# **EDIT** amend contents of cell

The EDIT key is used to amend the contents of text or formulae cells. Cells containing numbers cannot be amended using this control key. To amend a number position the grid cursor over the appropriate cell and re-type the number.

Use the arrow keys to move the cursor to the cell whose contents you wish to edit. Press EDIT and the contents of the current cell are displayed at the bottom of the screen. The ← and → keys can be used to position the line cursor at the bottom of the screen. The cell contents can be edited using the DELETE key to delete the character immediately to the left of the line cursor or by simply typing over the existing text or formula.

Press ENTER to copy the amended contents back into the current cell.

Note that editing a formula does not destroy the old formula from memory. The old, now redundant formula still occupies memory space. To erase redundant formulae completely you should use the OPTIMISE command.

# **DELETE** delete contents of cell

This control key deletes the contents of the cell at the current cursor position in the spreadsheet. All numbers, text and formulae are erased.

Although the DELETE key erases formulae from a cell, it does not erase a formula from memory. To erase unwanted formulae permanently you should use the OPTIMISE command described in section 7.

# H show HELP page

Pressing the H key displays the TASCALC help page. This help page summarises the various commands available in Command Mode. These commands are described in detail in the section dealing with Command Mode. Press ENTER to return to the spreadsheet when viewing the help page.

# P prompt on/off

TASCALC

The top section of the screen normally displays the 'prompt box'. This box summarises the various commands available as well as displaying the necessary prompts when using the TASCALC commands. The prompts are on when this information is shown at the top of the screen. The prompts are off when no information is shown at the top of the screen. Pressing the P key toggles the prompt information between on and off. Switching the prompts off enables a larger portion of the grid to be displayed. The screen displays 17 rows when the prompts are off and 13 rows when the prompts are on.

# **EXTEND MODE toggle status display**

The EXTEND MODE key toggles the status line display at the bottom of the screen. By default the TASCALC status line displays the current cell, column and current cell contents. Pressing the EXTEND MODE key changes the status line to display the free memory space and the memory space remaining for formulae. Pressing the EXTEND **MODE** key a second time toggles the status line back again.

## Screen attribute

The TASCALC screen colours can be changed by setting the screen attribute parameter. The screen attribute is equal to:

For example, to generate white text (white = 7) on black paper (black = 0):

Adding 64 to the screen attribute value makes the display bright.

#### Border attribute

The border colour attribute is calculated using the same formula for the screen attribute.

## Text default justification

Text entered into any cell can be automatically centred or justified to the left or right of the cell. The  $\leftarrow$  and  $\rightarrow$  keys toggle text justification between centre, left and right.

Changing this parameter only affects text entered *after* this option has been changed. Text already entered into a cell is still displayed according to the text justification setting when the text was entered. To rejustify existing text use the JUSTIFY command or position the grid cursor over the relevant cell and press the **EDIT** key to edit the text label. Pressing the **ENTER** key (without editing the text) enters the text back into the cell which is then justified according to the new 'text default justification' setting.

# Default no. of formula figures

The number of formula figures is the number of digits displayed in a cell which contains a formula. The maximum number of formula figures that can be displayed in any one cell is 14. The number of formula figures *includes* the decimal point.

Changing this parameter only affects formulae entered *after* this option has been changed. Any formulae that have been entered before this parameter is changed are still displayed according to the 'default number of formula figures' setting when those formulae were entered. If you wish to display existing formulae according to the new setting you must enter each formula again. The simplest method of achieving this is to position the grid cursor over the formula to be re-entered and press the **EDIT** key. Press **ENTER** to re-enter the formula into the current cell without editing the formula. The formula is then displayed according to the new 'default no. of formula' figures parameter.

## Calculation order

By default calculation of formulae takes place by column. The  $\leftarrow$  and  $\rightarrow$  keys toggle the calculation order of formulae to take place by row.

## Relative error default (letter)/(number)

A formula may make reference to the contents of another cell. The relative error default is the cell that is inserted if a formula contained within a cell cannot be relatively adjusted without going outside of the boundaries of the grid.

For example, cell A1 might contain the formula A157\*10. If A1 was copied to cell A2 then the formula should be relatively adjusted to read A158\*10. This is not possible as the formula now references a non-existent cell beyond the boundaries of the grid. The A157 in the formula is thus replaced by the cell which is named as the 'relative error default'.

The relative error default affects all commands that involve relatively adjusting a formula.

# Whole grid top left (letter)/(number)

During certain operations (COPY, RUBOUT, UNITS, ECHO and XECUTE), pressing the **ENTER** key in response to the prompt to enter a cell range, causes that operation to take place over the 'whole grid'. By default the 'whole grid' is defined to be the complete spreadsheet.

The 'whole grid' can be defined by the user. Redefining the 'whole grid' to the area you are working in results in increased program speed. Use the  $\leftarrow$  and  $\rightarrow$  keys to identify the cell which you require to be the top left cell of the 'whole grid'.

## Whole grid bottom right (letter)/(number)

The  $\leftarrow$  and  $\rightarrow$  keys toggle the default values to identify the bottom right cell of the 'whole grid' described above.

## Cell Working printed

The 'working cell' is the cell displayed at the bottom of the screen during some particular operations (XECUTE, COPY etc). Keeping the working cell switched on can have advantages. For example, the XECUTE operation recalculates all formulae within a given range. If an error occurs in a formula and the working cell is on, then the cell to which that error refers is shown on the screen.

Switching the working cell off can result in program speed increases of between 300%-600%.

# CODE1,CODE2,CODE3 etc

with a comma separating each code. The maximum number of characters that may be sent for each sequence is 55.

For example, the DECIMAL codes used by Epson-type printers for emphasised printing are:

27 69

You should enter the sequence 27,69. Alternatively you may enter the codes as ASCII codes. The equivalent codes in ASCII are:

27.E

Another application may be to print the title in the enlarged print type and the spreadsheet data in the condensed print type. On Epson-type printers the code to turn enlarged printing on is 14, the code to turn enlarged printing off is 20 and the code to turn condensed printing on is 15.

The time taken to perform this operation varies according to the number of formulae in memory and how much of the grid has to be searched to ascertain if a formula is still valid. It is strongly recommended that the working cell is switched off during an OPTIMISE operation to increase program speed (refer to the DESIGN command described in section 7). The OPTIMISE operation can be halted at any time by pressing the **BREAK** key and then pressing **ENTER** to return to the spreadsheet.

The OPTIMISE command can also be useful before saving the grid contents as a data file. By erasing any unwanted formulae the amount of data saved, and the space taken up on a disc, microdrive cartridge or cassette tape, is reduced.

# GRAPH plot line graph/bar chart

The GRAPH command plots a graph or bar chart of the numerical values in a specified range of cells.

Press the **GRAPH** key to select the graph option. You are prompted to enter the range of cells for which you wish to plot a graph. Type the required range or press the **ENTER** key to plot a graph for the 'whole grid'. Typing a . (fullstop) character selects the last range entered.

You are then asked whether you wish the scale to be printed on the y (vertical) axis. Press Y for YES or N for NO. If you choose to print a scale then four values are printed at quarterly intervals along the axis.

There is a short delay while TASCALC plots the graph. The graph is scaled according to the highest numerical value found within the specified range. You should note that values are plotted by column and from left to right. For example, plotting a graph over the range A001:C010 plots the values for the figures in column A, followed by the figures in column B and finally the figures in column C. If you require the figures to be plotted by row you should change the calculation order parameter (DESIGN command). The maximum number of points that can be plotted on a single graph is 100

The graph is then displayed on screen. The 'value' message at the bottom left of the screen displays the exact value of each point. Use the  $\uparrow$  and  $\downarrow$  keys to display the exact numerical values of each point plotted on the graph. There are a number of sub options:

# END return to spreadsheet

Press the E key to return to the spreadsheet.

# SAVE save graph to disc/microdrive/tape

The graph can be saved as a SCREEN\$ file. This file may be loaded after quitting TASCALC for printing (see Appendix 3).

#### 9 Formula Functions

Exemplae are used to perform calculations. Each formula consists of operands and operators combined to produce a numerical value.

A maximum of 120 characters may be entered into any one cell as a formula. To construct longer formulae you should enter parts of the formula into separate cells

#### Normal Functions

OPERATORS TASCALC uses three types of mathematical operators. These are:

#### Arithmetic Operators

# Appendix 1 – Interfaces (ZX Spectrum 128/+2)

To customise TASCALC for your printer interface you must select the install printer option (2) from the menu displayed on screen after loading TASCALC.

A list of printer interfaces is displayed on screen. Use the  $\downarrow$  and  $\uparrow$  keys to move the cursor to select the interface in use and press **ENTER**. The interface currently selected is shown at the bottom of the list. Use the  $\downarrow$  to select the EXIT option. Select option 4 to save your customised TASCALC to cassette or microdrive.

If you are using the built in RS232 port then you are presented with the option of selecting the required baud rate on EXITing from the printer installation option. Use the  $\uparrow$  and  $\downarrow$  keys to select the baud rate appropriate for your printer and press **ENTER**.

## ZX Interface 1

To customise TASCALC to print through the RS232 port of ZX Interface 1 select the 'UNSPECIFIED' option from the list of interfaces and press **ENTER**. Use the  $\downarrow$  key to EXIT from the install printer option.

Select option 3 to return to BASIC. Add the following line to the TASCALC BASIC program:

20 FORMAT "b"; XXXX: OPEN #3; "b"

where XXXX = printer baud rate.

# Appendix 2 – Printing from the ZX Spectrum +3

As supplied TASCALC is set up to print through the +3 parallel port. TASCALC can be customised to print through the +3 serial port by following the procedure detailed below. You must customise TASCALC on loading the program. You are also given the option of saving your configured TASCALC to disc.

 Load TASCALC in the usual way, selecting the +3 BASIC option from the menu and typing:

- 2. Once TASCALC has loaded, select option 2 to install your printer and press ENTER.

# 4. Printing & Signs

The pound sterling sign is not a standard ASCII symbol. Different printers use a variety of codes for the £ sign. The common ones are 35, 96 and 129.

It is often necessary to alter a switch inside the printer to select the UK character set. This normally selects a & sign instead of a hash.

As supplied, TASCALC sends a code 35 for the & sign. You can change the code sent by the program by executing the following procedure:

- (1) Load TASCALC in the usual manner.
- (2) Select option 3 after loading to return to BASIC.
- (3) Execute the following POKE:

POKE 48722,x

POKE 48894,x

where x = the code required by your printer for the  $\pounds$  sign.
